The EU has committed to reducing greenhouse gas emissions to 80-95% below 1990 levels by 2050. The European Council has recognised that this commitment will require a revolution in energy systems, one which must start now. As a result, the current "Energy Roadmap 2050" is being developed by the European Commission. This outlines the various paths that are suitable to achieve the objectives of the energy sector.
